Did you know you can opt your student out of an assignment if it conflicts with your religious beliefs?

The U.S. Constitution is interpreted by courts to mean that students may not be required in school to speak in a manner that directly conflicts with their religious beliefs (which would include reading and doing assignments using material that is religiously offensive to them). Parents also have a federal constitutional right to direct the upbringing and education of their children, particularly in areas of











education and sexuality. Public schools and their officials may not impermissibly force objectionable speech or assigned material on students that offends and contradicts the religious beliefs of students, or their parents. Before it may force a student to engage in religiously objectionable activities or speech, a school must prove that it has a compelling reason for requiring the student to participate in that particular activity and that this participation is the least restrictive means to accomplish the state's educational objectives for the assignment. Otherwise, the school must accommodate the student's First Amendment right to the free exercise of religion and right not to speak by permitting the child to opt out of the objectionable religious activity or class.

It is generally important, however, for a parent requesting an opt out to suggest an appropriate alternative activity for the child. Some teachers need this extra help and, truth be told, sometimes resist an accommodation merely in order to avoid the extra work that it will mean for them in finding a substitute activity for the student who is requesting the opt out. An appropriate alternative would be to simply go to the library and read the alternative book and do a report to achieve the grade for that section of work.
